




What you need to know: Tutor Groups


This is a form group you meet with every day for 20 minutes as part of your timetable, and is named after a country. In the daily 20 minute tutor sessions you will engage in lots of activities including numeracy, literacy, current affairs task, wellbeing tasks and many more.

Your tutor is the first member of staff you should go to if you need anything, alongside your Learning Manager, Mrs Laverick. S/he will monitor your rewards, behaviour, attendance and academic progress. There are competitions between the continents for attendance, spellings, sports events and more!



Rewards and Behaviour

We place great importance on rewarding students who are "getting it right". Just some of the rewards we give out are:



- Weekly Family Feast takeaway prize draw for 100% attendance that week
- End of year free trip for 100% attendance
- Juice and cookies with the principal for good effort in lessons
- Postcards sent home from teachers for working hard







However, sometimes when students don't "get it right", they will be placed into our consequence system to help. In the classroom, this will consist of a student getting three warnings (C1, C2, C3) and if the student does not modify their behaviour that is distracting others, they are given a C4, meaning they need to leave the class and go a central room for the remainder of the lesson which is staffed by senior leaders. The likely consequence of being removed from a lesson is a detention the following evening.

Lunches





Lunch menus roll on a 3 week programme. To the left you can see our 2020 menu which shows hot meals available each day, as well as the cost of a meal deal.

You will also notice that there is a selection of sandwiches, paninis, pasta pots, salad and jacket potatoes available every day as well.

Students are welcome to bring a packed lunch if they would prefer.

We are a cashless school, meaning parents will use an online app called ParentPay to put money on their child's account so they can purchase food (unless your child is on free school meals, then there is no need to do so).





What you can expect to see in lessons

- A 'Challenge' and 'Aspire' task Challenge will be something that pushes you but that you should be able to achieve by the end of the lesson. Aspire will be linked to really stretching your skills. You may or may not achieve this within a lesson but always give it a go!
- A praise board we love to make sure you are rewarded for focused learning, positive contributions, good manners and being respectful of staff and peers. Postcards, stickers and half termly rewards are given to those students who persistently get on the praise board.
- A consequence board disruption of learning and warnings for this will be placed on the consequence board. If your name appears on this board try to focus more on your learning or talking to your teacher about your work or if there is a problem. If you reach a C4 (after 4 warnings) you will receive a 30 minute detention and be asked to leave the classroom for the remainder of the lesson.
- SLT (Senior Leadership Team) and Learning Managers visiting your lessons Senior staff and your Learning Manager love to see all the amazing work you are doing in lessons. It is normal for them to come in to chat to you about your praise, consequences and the work you are doing. Some of you may lucky enough to receive an SLT postcard.



What you are expected to do in lessons

The 3 main expectations are that students:

- Be safe
- Be respectful
- Be responsible

We ask that all students come equipped to lesson with the correct stationary, their planner and a positive attitude towards learning. At the start of every lesson planners should be on desks, equipment should be out and you should be looking at your teacher ready for instruction.

The following boards are displayed in classrooms and act as a reminder for how we expect students to be respectful in lessons:

STAR

When a teacher says "3, 2, 1, STAR" in a lesson, this means they need you to stop what you are doing and give your full attention.



STEPS:

When you are addressing staff, to be respectful we expect Students to follow STEPS.

Student council

If you join the student council, you will be part of a student body who discuss key issues and be part of improving aspects of the academy. We hold whole school elections for Minister positions of different areas to be in charge of, e.g. Minister of Charities.



Student ambassadors

If you become a student ambassador, you will be part of a group of students who represent the academy at events such as open evenings, parents evenings, educational visits and many more.

What you need to know: What we don't allow in school

- Mobile phones and gadgets including MP3 players, headphones, smart watches
- Nail Polish nail polish and any type of false nails are not allowed.
- Jewellery Only a wrist watch/medic alert necklace or wristband are allowed. If you are having your ears pierced, please do this at the start of summer holidays, as earrings are not allowed, and must be removed before entering the school.
- Make-up students will be asked to remove makeup if worn and noticed by a member of staff.
- Henna Henna is not allowed in the Academy and must only be applied during the Summer break in order for it to fade away before September.
- Unnatural hairstyles or colours hairstyles and colours must be sensible. Hairbands & accessories must be purple or black.
- Chewing Gum
- Some outdoor coats- hoodies, fur, denim and studded leather jackets are not allowed.
- Items of clothing not on the uniform list
- Fizzy drinks and excessive quantities of junk food (e.g. large bags of sweets, sharing bags of crisps)



Frequently asked questions from new students

What if I am late to school?

If you are late to school you will be signed in with a late slip and, unless there is a genuine reason which has been confirmed by a parent, you will receive a detention.

What if I am ill?

Your parent will need to phone school on the morning of your absence and every following day you are not in school on 01642 454577.

What if I become ill at school?

If you feel ill at school, you will need to go to the Attendance Office (located next to reception) and speak to one of the attendance team.

Who can I talk to if I am worried about something?

Your tutor should be your first contact if you have any worries or concerns. This is a member of staff you see everyday for 20 minutes during tutor period. You also have a Learning Manager, Mrs Laverick, who will be available to support you.

What if I get lost?

You will be given a map of the school in your planner to help you navigate around the building. However if you do get lost, there will be plenty of staff and students on the corridors to help you find your way to your lesson. Don't worry about getting lost, we don't expect you know your way around in your first week!
